<sup>i</sup> Hawaii's trafficking in persons law is expressly inapplicable to sex trafficking.

<sup>ii</sup> Force, fraud, or coercion is not required for a facilitator conviction under the New Mexico trafficking law.

<sup>iii</sup> Ohio's human trafficking law eliminates the requirement to prove force, fraud or coercion when the victim is under 16 years of age or the victim is 16 or 17 and the defendant is in a position of authority or trust as described in Ohio Rev. Code Ann. § 2907.3(A)(5), (6), (7), (8), (9), (10), (11), (12), or (13).

<sup>iv</sup> Oregon's human trafficking law eliminates the requirement to prove force, fraud, or coercion when the victim is under 15 years of age.
