

Shared Hope International conducted research in more than a dozen locations through the United States and found American children being used in the commercial sex industry. Children who are exploited through prostitution, pornography and sexual entertainment are victims of domestic minor sex trafficking. Due to misidentification, ignorance, or efforts to keep victims safe from traffickers, these minors are often labeled as delinquents and placed in detention facilities.

Defining the Problem

Domestic minor sex trafficking is the "recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision or obtaining of a person for the purpose of a commercial sex act," where the person is a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident under the age of 18 years. It is not necessary to prove force, fraud, coercion or movement was used to cause the exploitation through trafficking of a child.
