The Report Cards on Child & Youth Sex Trafficking Advanced Legislative Framework builds on the original Protected Innocence Challenge Framework, preserving the most fundamental components while including new policy priorities that reflect feedback and research from the field—particularly in the area of victim protections. The advanced framework will be used to grade the states next fall when we release the inaugural Report Cards on Child & Youth Sex Trafficking. As such, the 2021 legislative session is a critical time for your state to strengthen its laws before report cards and corresponding grades are issued.

So what is **WISCONSIN's** current score and what changes are needed? As of August 1, 2019, **WISCONSIN HAD RAISED ITS GRADE FROM D TO B:**

Wisconsin's human trafficking offense includes any child who is bought for sex regardless of whether force, fraud, or coercion was used, regardless of whether the buyer exploited

the child without a trafficker's involvement, and regardless of whether the victim identifies a trafficker. However, state law does not prohibit the criminalization of minors for prostitution, nor does it provide for a statutory avenue to specialized services.
