The Report Cards on Child & Youth Sex Trafficking Advanced Legislative Framework builds on the original Protected Innocence Challenge Framework, preserving the most fundamental components while including new policy priorities that reflect feedback and research from the field—particularly in the area of victim protections. The advanced framework will be used to grade the states next fall when we release the inaugural Report Cards on Child & Youth Sex Trafficking. As such, the 2021 legislative session is a critical time for your state to strengthen its laws before report cards and corresponding grades are issued.

So what is **MAINE**'s current score and what changes are needed? As of August 1, 2019, **MAINE HAD RAISED ITS GRADE FROM F TO D:**

Maine's aggravated sex trafficking law does not apply to buyers, leaving limited options for combatting demand. Although Maine prohibits the criminalization

of minors for trafficking offenses, state law does not provide for a general or specialized service response, leaving survivors disconnected from resources that are necessary to address trauma and promote healing.
